In the light of the extraordinary refugee situation of 2015-2016, the need for opening up, or expanding existing, legal routes to protection in the EU has received increased attention among politicians and the public.

Resettlement is an important element of such legal routes and one of three main long-term solutions for refugees alongside return (the preferred solution) and integration in the country of first refuge. Resettlement refers to the transfer of refugees from the country of first refuge to a country willing to admit them.

In order to improve knowledge about existing resettlement schemes in the EU and Norway, the EMN is currently conducting a study on resettlement and other forms of humanitarian admission. This Conference aims to provide a platform for sharing and discussing the results of this study. The Conference will compare different national approaches and initiatives, provide information on the Swedish resettlement program, and outline possible ways forward, such as a common Resettlement Framework for the EU and the project EU-FRANK (Facilitating Resettlement and Refugee Admission through New Knowledge).
